

### My Town, My Plan Community Training Programme

#### **September 2019 - May 2020**

Participants of the **My Town**, **My Plan** Community Training Programme have developed this Ideas document, with the support of the programme Facilitators and Trainers during the twelve session programme. This Ideas Document is intended as a means to further develop a strategy/plan for the area, seek funding and/or prioritise actions.

The objective of the community training programme was to provide an innovative approach to support future planning and development of community resources in towns and their hinterlands. Training workshops were used to provide information, stimulate discussions, link resources and develop ideas for each of the areas in conjunction with the community.

Hincks Centre for Entrepreneurship Excellence, part of the School of Business at Cork Institute of Technology delivered the My Town, My Plan Community Training Programme in collaboration with SECAD Partnership CLG (SECAD). SECAD is a Local Development Company that delivers a range of rural development and social inclusion programmes including LEADER 2014-2020, the Social Inclusion & Community Activation Programme, the Rural Social Scheme, Tus, PEIL 2014-2020 and others.

The programme was delivered as part of the LEADER Programme in South and West Cork, which SECAD manages as an Implementing Partner on behalf of the South and West Cork Local Community Development Committee and Cork County Council.



















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### 1. Introduction

Welcome to the Skibbereen strategic plan drafted by community members and business representatives under the guidance of SECAD Partnership CLG and the Hincks Centre, CIT, during the autumn/winter of 2019/2020. This process is part of a community effort to support Skibbereen to adapt to the needs of both present and future. It focuses on the 'unity' aspect of 'community' by encouraging the integration of the excellent work, including voluntary input, being carried out on a number of levels across the town and beyond.

### 2. Town Profile

#### 2.1. Location and Context

Skibbereen is the most southerly town in Ireland, located 340km from Dublin and 75km from Cork Airport. A 16km radius takes in a variety of villages including, but not limited to, Ballydehob, Baltimore, Glandore, Leap and Union Hall, depicted in Appendix B, Map 1.

#### 2.2. Demographic Profile

Skibbereen is a market town with a population of almost 3,000 people in the urban area (CSO, 2016). It is served by 4 primary schools, since 2017 a new community school following the amalgamation of 3 secondary schools, along with two further education facilities with the Education and Training Board at the Sutherland Centre and the West Cork Campus of the College of Commerce at Rossa College.

#### 2.3. Economic Profile

Skibbereen serves a hinterland of about 10,000 within a 16km radius. It has a busy cattle mart along with the NCT and driving licence centres for West Cork. From a town that was devastated in the 1980s following the closure of the Erin Foods co-op and

mass emigration of school leavers from the town, it is heartening to see its rebirth through the 2000s right through to today. Examples of key employers today include Fields of Skibbereen, O'Donnell Furniture Makers, West Cork Distillers, Spearline, The Ludgate Hub and the Fresh Fish Deli. See Appendix a for a brief profile of each.

One of Skibbereen's better-known residents, David Puttnam, has said of Skibbereen: 'it is a wonderful, wonderful place to live'. Anyone who lives here will undoubtedly agree and we want to make the experience even better and extend it beyond the town. Already, the Taste of West Cork food festival extends far beyond Skibbereen - its central hub. Similarly, the West Cork Arts Centre, based in the Uillinn in Skibbereen, has programme participants from across the southwest region. See Appendix B for contextual maps.

#### 3. Consultation Process

Approximately 50 people attended the Skibbereen launch of the SECAD 'My Town, My Plan' community training programme in May 2019. It was an interactive session where all attendees were given red stickers to identify projects of interest that might be pursued as part of the programme in the autumn / winter months to follow. Attendees were invited to share their email addresses and 21 addresses were collected by the SECAD organisers. When the training sessions were launched in autumn, the attendance changed from session to session but contact details were gathered throughout. This became an integral part of the consultation process enabling regular contact and sharing of information amongst what would become a core group.

In order to develop the ideas into strategic goals, a variety of communication channels was central to soliciting feedback on the ideas from the initial group of interested stakeholders. This was supplemented by a carefully designed survey distributed through social and print media channels. The survey aimed to gather feedback from a wide, age-based demographic who live within a 16km radius of Skibbereen, who work in the Skibbereen area or have visited the town. As such, it was an important element of the consultation process and, with 415 respondents, was considered a representative sample of the target population. Given that the survey did not target the under-18 age group in the survey results, a separate survey was issued to staff and students of Skibbereen Community School yielding a further 112 responses.

### **Appendix A: Company Profile Selection**

Fields of Skibbereen has been run by the Field family since 1935. It currently employs 180 people and 'is one of those places that couldn't exist anywhere other than in the quizzical, poetical mystery that is West Cork. Relationships in West Cork work differently than in the rest of Ireland, and John Field personifies this with his support for local producers, his championing of their work, his knowledge that they give his shop a uniqueness that matches the area.' - John McKenna (source: www.fieldsofskibbereen.ie/aboutus).

O'Donnell Furniture Makers have roots steeped in West Cork history, back as far as 1902 when 'John Reen, great grandfather of the present day Managing Director, Aodh O'Donnell, made a chair from a local ash tree' (source: <a href="https://www.odonnellfurniture.com/about/">www.odonnellfurniture.com/about/</a>).

West Cork Distillers, established in 2003 by 'three lifelong friends who set about establishing a distillery to produce the highest quality spirits and provide sustainable employment in this beautiful and remote part of Ireland' (source:

https://www.westcork-

<u>distillers.com/</u>). In 2013, West Cork Distillers leased the 10,000 sq. ft. West Cork Bottling plant to start producing fine spirits. This was followed in 2016 with the purchase of the former Erin Foods factory where a new visitor centre is due to be opened imminently.


Spearline, 'a market leading network intelligence company' (source: <a href="www.spearline.com/team">www.spearline.com/team</a>) was 'founded in 2003 by CEO Kevin Buckley and CTO Matthew Lawlor. It has a global presence in 60 countries and works with an impressive roster of high-profile clients such as Google, Microsoft, Airbnb and Skype' (source: <a href="www.siliconrepublic.com/jobs/spearlinecork-skibbereen">www.siliconrepublic.com/jobs/spearlinecork-skibbereen</a>). Kevin is on video record referring to a vision of Skibbereen as 'the digital capital of the world.'

Between the two organisations, Spearline and West Cork Distillers currently employ in excess of 120 in Skibbereen excluding indirect employment through their respective buildings' redevelopment and refurbishment.

The Ludgate Hub, with its 1Gb connectivity supporting the town, has turned Skibbereen into a 'connected community' (source: <a href="www.ludgate.ie">www.ludgate.ie</a>) supporting global business in a wonderful location on the Wild Atlantic Way. 'The Ludgate Hub in Skibbereen is leading the way as a demonstration of what is possible if a rural community is given access to high speed broadband' (source: <a href="www.ludgate.ie/the-1-gig-society">www.ludgate.ie/the-1-gig-society</a>). Its development has brought considerable business to the town with 100 new jobs to date and no sign of slowing down.





Map 2 a and b: Where is Skibbereen?






Map 3: Ludgate hub members' residential locations
